# **Ball Ground Celebrates 70th Anniversary**



In 1951 the garden club in Ball Ground was founded. On November 16, 2021 we celebrated 70 years as a club at the Wheeler House in Ball Ground. Amazingly mothers, grandmothers and some charter members attended the celebration, along with Laurel District Director Susan Stephens and other dignitaries. The name Anetsa-Ga-Da is Cherokee for 'ball ground'. The club has grown from 29 original members to 53 members. In the past year we have gained our 501(c)(3) status so that tax-free contributions are accepted. One of the main accomplishments of the club has been the development of a one city square block botanical garden in downtown Ball Ground. The club sponsors a plant sale and festival at the botanical garden each spring (May 21st this year). The club is a proud member of the National Garden Clubs, Inc., the Garden Club of Georgia and the Laurel District Garden Clubs.

Urban Farms Field Trip

In mid-February members of the Ball Ground Garden Club (BGGC) participated in a Tower Garden Workshop at the ATL Urban Farms greenhouse nestled in the northeast corner of Cherokee County and just minutes away from Gibbs Gardens. They were introduced to tower, aeroponic and hydroponic gardening.

ATL Urban Farms (<a href="www.AtlUrbanFarms.com">www.AtlUrbanFarms.com</a>) is a Certified Seedling Provider producing seedlings in rockwool, for aeroponic Tower Gardens and hydroponic growing systems. They provide fresh produce, seedlings, and Tower Gardens for home use or commercial farms.


The greenhouses produce plants 4-5x as fast as traditional farming. The farm exhibits the potential future of produce farming in Georgia, growing lettuce, tomatoes, and herbs in a confined space. The field trip was educational and fun.

### SGC MEMBERS ATTEND PETITE DESIGN WORKSHOP BY



#### GARDENING IN MACON SPEAKERS





Bonnie Satterthwaite originally from Savannah, is the Southeast Territory Sales Manager for the Espoma Company. The Espoma Company is a partner with National Garden Clubs, Inc providing garden clubs with grants, educational materials and meeting speakers. Bonnie has been involved in the lawn and garden industry for over 30 years and has taught hundreds of classes and been a featured speaker at garden club meetings, garden center events and radio programs relating the benefits of organic gardening. She will be presenting "There was no Miracle Gro in the Garden of Eden!"



Stan Gray has been growing iris for more than 60 years mostly on his family property in northern New Jersey, where his parents' gardens were planted in the late 1920's. He has been affiliated with the American Iris Society for more than 50 years and is well known as an iris grower to some of the nation's leading hybridizers. In 2007, Stan moved his entire New Jersey collection to Savannah for incorporation into the floral display at the then Bamboo Farm & Coastal Gardens under an agreement with the University of Georgia. For the next eight years, Stan focused exclusively on the testing of tall bearded iris, to determine which varieties would be able to withstand the rigorous environmental conditions of Savannah: Stan's newest collection of Louisiana Iris has been included in the Louisiana Iris Species Preservation Project that is now being showcased at the Coastal Georgia Botanical Gardens in Savannah, GA. Stan's talk is titled "When Iris Eves Are Smiling."







Laura Martin and her husband live in Atlanta, Georgia. where she happily tends a large, wayward garden. She has had a long, happy career as an author and botanical illustrator, having published 26 books over the past 40 plus years. A degree in botany from UGA and a certificate degree in Botanical Art and Illustration from the New York Botanical Gardens gave her the technical foundation to explore both the world of science and of art. In addition to her books, Martin wrote a weekly gardening column for the AJC for 9 years and was gardening editor for several magazines. While not writing or gardening, Laura paints, weaves, plays the piano, creates miniature fairy homes and gardens, cooks and tends to grandchildren as often as possible. Laura will present "Taming the Natives: Celebrating North American Wildflowers." Her latest book. A. Naturalist's Book of Wildflowers, as well as her award winning book for children. Nature's Art Box, will be for sale following her lecture.

### Marshall Forest

#### Report by Caroline Alford, Chair

#### February 17, 2022 Gainesville, GA

Marshall Forest has been the scene of much activity this fall and winter. Many community groups have worked together to help make improvements in the forest. The parking lot is full most nice days as many are using the trails as a means of getting out in nature and away from the crowds with Covid still an issue.

Andrew Saville, the son of a Garden Club Member, has kept the Pecan Field mowed from spring through late fall.

The large pecan tree branches that fell during the winter storms have been removed.

The annual Robert Week Memorial Walk, October 15, 2021, was sponsored by Keep Rome Floyd Beautiful in conjunction with the Young Professionals of the Rome Floyd Chamber of Commerce, The Nature Conservancy, The Garden Club of Georgia, and The Weed Family. Over 60 forest enthusiasts turned out for the walk along the Big Pine Braille Trail led by Caroline Alford on the gorgeous fall day. News coverage of the walk was provided by the *Rome News Tribune* with two separate articles. The Nature Conservancy Fire Crew plans to reinstall the Braille signs that have fallen off the stands.

The Fire Crew is scheduled to replace rotten boards on the wet weather creek bridge this spring. Tours of the forest have been scheduled for March 12th and during Garden Week in Georgia.

Marshall Forest still has many things that need to be done to keep the trail well maintained and accessible to the physically impaired.

Finish replacing the remaining guide rope posts. The Boy Scout Council has been contacted to inform them about this potential Eagle Scout project.

Reinstallation of the guide ropes with climbing rope donated by a climbing gym in Marietta.

Installation of crusher run gravel along the Braille Trail to provide more accessibility to the physically impaired.

Creation of QR codes to provide trail maps, Forest information, and plant identification photos.

The Nature Conservancy is working on a partnership with Berry College and Shorter University to create learning centers in the Pecan field and over to the Coosa River. The goal is to make the Marshall Forest a destination for student field trips. In addition, TNC is working to establish a working relationship with the City of Rome and TRED to apply for a GOSA grant to upgrade the trails and make other improvements close to the river.

Your contributions help us keep the Marshall Forest in good condition for visitors. Please don't forget to add Marshall Forest to your club's list of contributions. Deed of Gratitude certificates will be presented to contributors of \$25 or more to Marshall Forest by March 1 of each year.
