Garden Club and Scouts Get the "Wild" in at Mcfarlane

Sope Creek Garden Club participated, along with Bov Scouts from Troop 1011, in the planting of over 350 plants to begin a small meadow installation at the McFarlane Nature Park in East Cobb. The approximately 10' x 40' space was prepared with an aerator to break up the soil, which is quite rich due to years of farming and grazing prior to establishment of the nature park. The plants were mainly landscape-size plugs, 5" x 2", of two different kinds of grasses, rudbeckia, heliopsis, solidago and vernonia. Members contributed swamp sunflower and The area ageratum. was overseeded with baptisia, stokesia, liatris and clover.

McFarlane Nature Park is home to display gardens of Piedmontnative plants, established and maintained by Master Gardener Volunteers of Cobb County, some of whom are also members of Sope Creek GC. The Park also has a tree collection of at least one specimen of every Piedmontnative tree, and a collection of about 150 native azaleas, some of which were planted by Sope Creek members.
