Annual Meeting in Cartersville. More information will be sent out soon. We have made arrangements with the Hilton Inn for those who wish to stay overnight.



<u>Sope Creek Celebrates 75th Anniversary with Luncheon,</u> <u>Artifacts Review</u>



P earls, hats, gloves, and fascinators all made an appearance at the 75th Anniversary Luncheon of the Sope Creek Garden Club, part of the Marietta Council. Thirty of the 42 members gathered at the Swan Coach House BelleNita Room, with a beautiful day to enjoy the adjacent patio. They were joined by their guest, Susan Stephens, the Laurel District Director.

The club was founded in 1947 by Mrs. G. H. Coates, Sr. of the Coates Thread Company family, who was, at the time, one of the few accredited National Garden Club flower show judges in the Atlanta area. At the event, yearbooks of the early years were displayed, showing the names of many prominent families in the East Cobb area.

Many charter members listed the names of their properties in lieu of street addresses: Mrs. M. A. Ross of Sunnybrook Farm, Mrs. A. R. Miegel of Thunderwood Farm, Mrs. A. Loudermilk of Home Sweet Home, and Mrs. Floyd Spruill, of Chattahoochee River Farm, part of which is now McFarlane Nature Park, where a number of club members volunteer today.

As members paged through old scrapbooks, they found that the early club was active in the community, helping to fund the Marietta Educational Garden Center, a project that continues today. The name of the group was inspired by their desire to landscape and beautify the area around the covered bridge that originally crossed Sope Creek on Paper Mill Rd. When the covered bridge burned in 1964, the members urged then County Commissioner Ernest Barrett to address rebuilding the historic bridge.

Three large-format yearbooks were also on display from the early years. After the luncheon, these artifacts of the club's history were delivered to the Cherokee Garden Library where they will join the archives of other club memories already housed there.

The Cherokee Rose is the State flower of Georgia and was also chosen to represent Sope Creek Garden Club by its founders.



<u>FLOWER SHOW SCHOOL BEGINS AUGUST 21,</u> 2022 IN MARIETTA

The Laurel District is proud to announce that it is co-sponsoring a Flower Show School in Marietta beginning August 2022. The school, the first in Georgia in 5 years, is a NGC accredited program to train flower show judges in judging and exhibiting both design and horticulture. This is a joint effort of the Laurel District, Redbud District, Creative Study Club, The Designers Club, North Georgia Council of Flower Show Judges and Rome Federation of Garden Clubs.

The four course School teaches all you need to know to judge, enter, compete, and chair an NGC flower show. Each course presents a deep dive on key principles and elements of design, judging criteria for designs and horticulture. You'll get a thorough understanding of flower show procedure. Learn just what makes a blue-ribbon entry. All classes are taught by experienced and credentialed instructors.

It's an intensive, highly rewarding experience. The Horticulture curriculum covers more than just how plants grow. You'll discover how to select, groom, and exhibit your plant. You'll write a flower show schedule and critique exhibits.

Design sessions will give you a handle on the Principles and Elements of Design. You'll get the tools you need to evaluate various NGC types such as Creative Line, Creative Mass, Cascade, Multi-rhythmic, Table Designs and many more.



For flower show procedure, expect to gain enough knowledge to host your own show and to become an accredited flower show judge. You'll learn how to constructively critique design, horticulture, and educational exhibits.

All classes will be held at the Marietta Educational Garden Center in downtown Marietta on Kennesaw Avenue. Dates are as follows:

2022 1st Course: Aug. 21, 22, 23, 24 2023 2nd Course: April 23, 24, 25, 26 2023 3rd Course: Aug. 27, 28, 29, 30 2024 4th Course: Feb. 25, 26, 27, 28



Challenge yourself! If you've got an itch, scratch it at the first session, at least. You'll be getting more information as plans firm up in the next couple of months. Land Trust Marshall Forest Report

Land Trust Marshall Forest Caroline Alford, Chairman April 12-13, 2022 Macon, GA

Marshall Forest has been the scene of much activity this winter and spring. Many community groups have worked together to help make improvements in the forest. The parking lot is full most nice days as many are using the trails as a means of getting out in nature and away from the crowds with covid still an issue.

- Andrew Saville, the son of a Garden Club Member, has kept the Pecan Field mowed.
- The large pecan tree branches that fell during the winter storms have been removed.
- The Nature Conservancy Fire Crew plans to reinstall the Braille signs that have fallen off the stands using longer bolts, lock washers and nuts.
- The Fire Crew is scheduled to replace rotten boards on the wet weather creek bridge this spring.
- Tours of the forest have been scheduled for March 12th and April 19th during Garden Week in Georgia.

Marshall Forest still has many things that need to be done to keep the trail well maintained and accessible to the physically impaired.

- Finish replacing the remaining guide rope posts. A Garden Club member's son has chosen Marshall Forest for his Eagle Scout Project. It is in the planning stages.
- Reinstallation of the guide ropes with climbing rope donated by a climbing gym in Marietta.
- Installation of crusher run gravel along the Braille Trail to provide more accessibility to the physically impaired.
- Creation of QR codes to provide trail maps, Forest information, and plant identification photos.

The Nature Conservancy is working on a partnership with Berry College and Shorter University to create learning centers in the Pecan field and over to the Coosa River. The goal is to make the Marshall Forest a destination for student field trips. In addition, TNC is working to establish a working relationship with the City of Rome and TRED to apply for a GOSA grant to upgrade the trails and make other improvements close to the river.

A list if the donors to Marshall Forest will be listed by District in Board Briefs. Deed of Gratitude Certificates will be printed for those contributing before March 1st once the list has been received.

Your contributions help us keep the Marshall Forest in good condition for visitors. Please don't forget to add Marshall Forest to your club's list of contributions. Deed of Gratitude certificates will be presented to contributors of \$25 or more to Marshall Forest by March 1 of each year.
