
# Cherokee Garden Library for District Directors

On August 19 orientation to the **Cherokee Garden Library** was conducted by Staci Catron, Cherokee Garden Library Director. The facility, part of the **Atlanta History Center**, houses more than 32,000 works including books, photographs, manuscripts, and landscape drawings. In addition to the extensive collections, the library offers lectures, exhibitions, tours, and collaborations with partner agencies. It is accessible to anyone interested in exploring gardening, landscape design, garden history, floral design, botanical art, and plant ecology, among other topics. More that fifteen officers of Garden Club of Georgia's seven districts, along with state President Barbara Bourque, participated in the orientation.

Attending from Laurel District were Marie Purser, District Director, and Linda Hardie, of Cumming Garden Club, who serves as Laurel District GCL Chairman.

Orientation was followed by lunch at the Swan House, adjacent to the library.

Current projects underway at the library include collections of postcards of Georgia landscapes, gardens, and scenes from days-gone-by. Individuals and clubs are encouraged to consider sharing their historic "finds" with the library for consideration.

At the Cherokee Garden Library's fall lecture—in partnership with The Garden Conservancy—Deborah Nevins' talk will feature the work of her New York-based landscape design firm, Deborah Nevins & Associates, including examples of the firm's purpose to go beyond solely being beautiful in their commitment to sustainability.

Nevins' design work is steeped in her vast knowledge of architectural and landscape history. After earning a Master of Art History from Columbia University, she lectured on landscape history at Barnard College and the Cooper Hewitt Museum for a decade, later morphing her passions into an extraordinary career in garden design.

Her firm is known for its expertise in working with fragile natural environments using indigenous plant communities in harmony with the local ecology—especially wetlands and protected areas in the U.S. and beyond. Key principles in the firm's approach to sustainability include ease of maintenance, function and performance, safety, and universal accessibility.

Nevins' firm designs projects all over the world, ranging in size from compact urban gardens to a ranch of several thousand acres. Major projects include the 40-acre Stavros Niarchos Cultural Center and Park in Athens, Greece, in collaboration with Italian designer Renzo Piano's firm; the expansion of the campus of the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston; and significant gardens and estates throughout the United States, the Caribbean, and Europe, including those of Michael Eisner, David Geffen, and Tommy Hilfiger. Deborah Nevins is revered among designers and clients throughout the world.





The PLANT AMERICA Community Project Grants Program is sponsored by National Garden Clubs, Inc. for new or existing club projects in their respective communities. Projects may be a joint venture with another organization/s. The scope of these projects may include:

- Beautification and/or restoration
- Community gardens
- School gardens/classrooms
- Habitat for Humanity landscaping
- Blue Star Memorial landscaping
- Implementation of environmental practices
- A horticulture or environmental educational event for the public

Grant Amount: Up to \$1,000.00 is available to be used for direct expenses of projects.

## Who May Apply:

- Individual garden clubs that are members of National Garden Clubs, Inc.
- NOTE: Recipients of previous PLANT AMERICA Community Project Grants are NOT eligible to apply.

## How to Apply:

- Application is limited to a TOTAL of two (2) pages.
  - > ONE (1) PAGE Application Form
  - > ONE (1) PAGE Budget
- Applications of more than two pages will NOT be considered.

- Recipients of grants will be notified, and all money will be awarded by January 31, 2020.
- Projects must be completed by February 28, 2021; final report forms due by April 1, 2021.

Impact and scope of project	25	Application form complete	5

Grants will not be provided for:

- Projects in which club does not participate in some aspect
- Purchase of Blue Star Memorial Markers
- Competitive Flower Shows
- Eagle Scout projects
- Salaries or benefits of personnel
- Political action programs
- Capital drives and building funds
- Scholarships and endowments
- Private gardens
- Lawsuits and litigation
- Overhead costs

## **Final Report:**

- 1. **Deadline:** within two months after the completion of the project or by April 1, 2021.
- Send the following:
  - A short one-to-two page report describing the project including photos
  - A copy of the final financial report including all income and expenses
  - A copy of any publicity

# Sixes Community Garden Club

Sixes Community Garden Club installed their second "Tiny Garden Door" at Lewis Park in Cherokee County

550 Merchants Glen Dr.-Woodstock, Georgia.

**Tiny Garden Door:** The "Tiny Door" was placed at a hollow in a large tree at the end of the "Natural Fairy Trail" created by Analise Black, a Sophomore at Etowah High School. Miss Black created the trail to earn her Girl Scout "Gold Award". The trail will allow children to use their imaginations to create "Fairly Houses" from natural materials in the area.

This particular door is constructed from 100 year old reclaimed wood and has our Georgia State Flower "The Cherokee Rose" hand carved on the door. The Sixes Garden Club has planted three Georgia native woodland ferns and five native woodland plants near the door. The plantings are identified with plant markers for future gardeners learning about our native plants while on the hiking trail. In keeping with the natural theme we only used native Georgia plantings and natural elements (rocks, moss, etc.) to form the surrounding Lake Allatoona area.

The Ribbon Cutting at the "Tiny Garden Door" and the "Demonstration Day for the "Fairy Trail" was August 10th.









## First Tiny Garden Door

To celebrate "Georgia Garden Week" Sixes Garden Club installed our 1st "Tiny Garden Door" at the historic Crescent Rock Barn, Marietta Hwy., Canton GA. The door was created to symbolize the history of the Rock Barn as a "Thoroughbred Trotter" Barn. The door was placed in the cutting bed that was built in a joint effort with an "Eagle Scout" project and the Sixes Garden Club a few years ago. Annual planting were added to beautify the historic site. Sixes Community Garden club holds their monthly meetings at the Barn.
